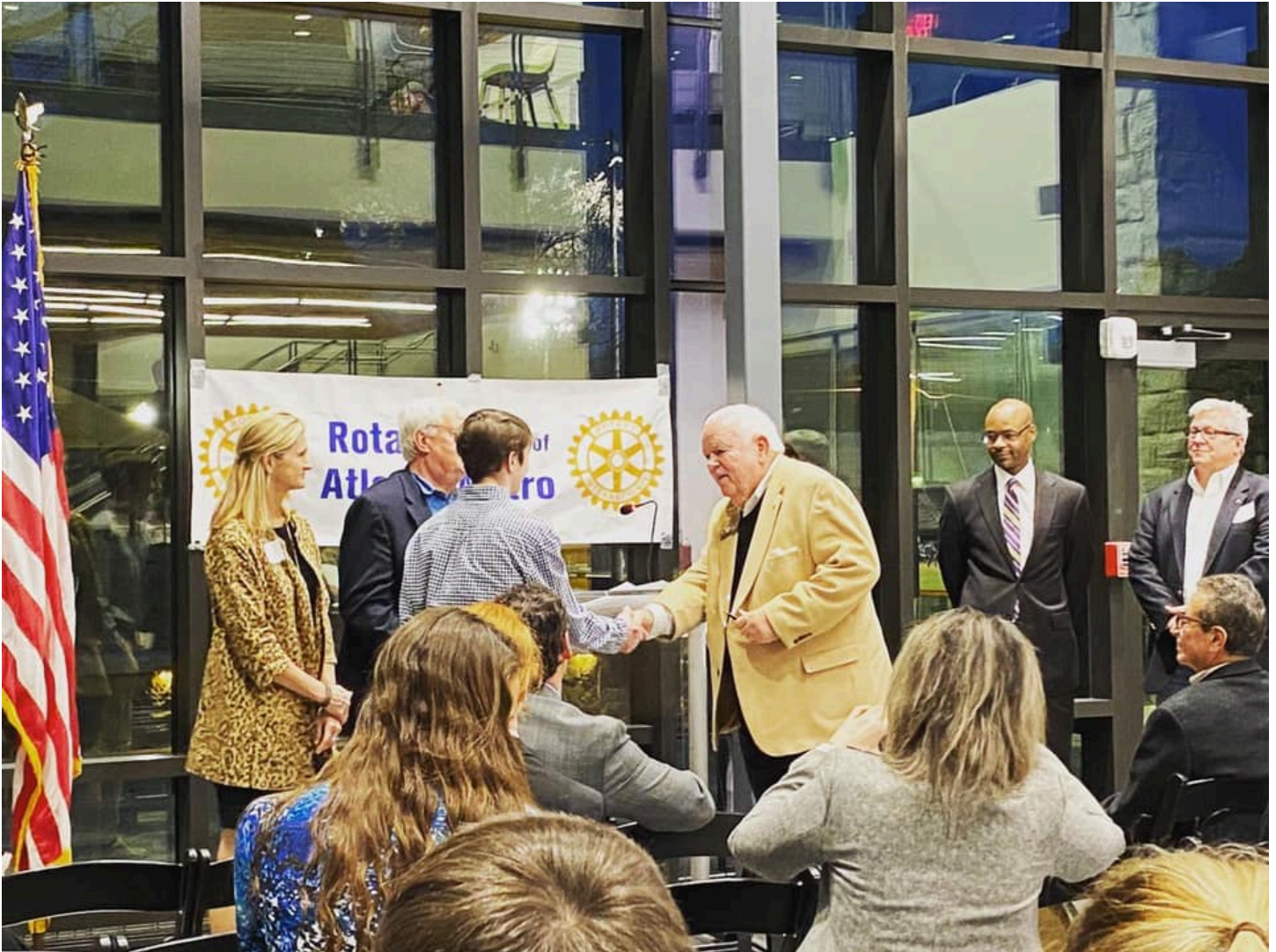


From Our District Governor

Those dollars come from our dues and contributions. We are a very big part of this important work that is truly "Service above Self."

When "this too does pass", we will look back with some sadness about missing so many of our important gatherings and being together in person, but we will also gather the facts about all that we did as clubs and Rotarians to help. And I suspect we will realize this has been one of our greatest years.

Urgent Request for Disaster Relief Funds - District 6900 and The Rotary Foundation



So Now What? What are we doing today that makes tomorrow different? Here are two actions you, with your Rotary Club, can take now that help other District 6900 Rotarians give life changing care in their corners of the world.

- **Opportunity #1 - At Home** - This world's corner is Southwest Georgia, where all types of PPE and hand sanitizers are needed in every community. District 6900 is seeking money that will be used by Rotarians to purchase protective and sanitation supplies. These supplies will be distributed to SWG First Responders, Community Assistance Leagues and Non-Profit organizations who are in direct contact with the children, elderly and disabled citizens in their neighborhoods.

Here's the Why: This Georgia area has the highest per capita COVID-19 death rate in the USA. Infection rates are still growing.

- **Opportunity #2 - Far Away** - Remote Bangladesh is this corner of our world. Over the past three years, Clubs in District 6900 supported a Rotary-sponsored rural hospital as they expanded cancer detection and treatment services into remote communities through equipping mobile testing vehicles with clinics reaching patients with no alternative access to care. During the past month, this hospital was designated a COVID-19 Treatment only facility by the Government and the entire city is quarantined. Along with other districts in Norway and Bangladesh, the North Columbus Club and District 6900 are submitting a Global Grant Request from The Foundation to purchase food, ventilators and COVID-19 testing kits for the hospital. We need \$4,500 in additional funds to complete the grant.

Here's the Why: The hospital is not equipped for COVID patients - they have no automatic ventilators

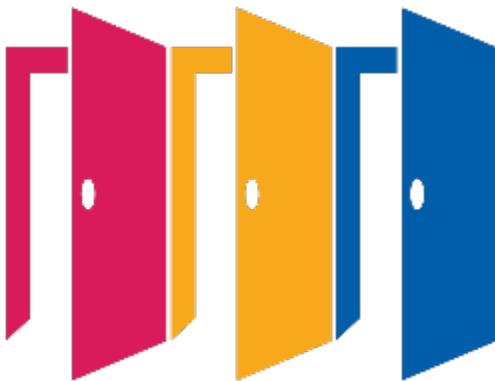
or virus testing kits. Patient families have no food while their key source of support is sick and they have no possibility of returning home at present.

District 2020-21 Grant Deadline Extended to Monday, June 1, 2020

Due to the current situation with COVID-19, the deadline to submit your District Grant application for 2020-2021 has been extended. The new deadline is **Monday, June 1, 2020**. This should allow extra time for you to evaluate community needs and to work with your community partners to determine the best use of funds to meet those needs. This applies to both standard and competitive grants. Competitive grants will be reviewed on Wednesday, June 3rd 2020.

Please do not wait until June 1 to submit your grant. It is best to **submit at least one week prior to the new deadline** so the grant application can be reviewed, and changes made if necessary.

Due to the extension, no District Grant applications will be accepted after June 1, 2020.

NEWS FOR STUDENTS NEXT YEAR

We have received no information in regards to next year at newsletter submission date; however, a decision is to be made shortly as to whether or not we will even have a program this year in order to allow students who were offered scholarships before the pandemic to explore other options. My gut feeling is that we will have a program and I have already made inquiries to some host families and all the trustees in regards to next year, i.e., if the dorms close, would the host families be able to house the student or would the clubs want to sponsor a student for the next semester? Our district stands at about 50% wanting to sponsor a student for next year; however, the other two districts are overwhelmingly in favor of continuing the program through next year.

We have heard nothing from the universities about issuing the form I20s, which allow a student to seek a visa from the consulate in their countries in order to come to the US. My own experience is that it is

nearly impossible to get anyone at the universities to answer an email or a telephone call to find out when or if they will be issuing the I20s for next year.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE AWARDS

We would normally be giving out information from District Conference in regards to awards given to each club for giving and to individual Rotarians or students, but this will have to wait until after the District celebration on June 13.

INCENTIVE CHECKS

Trustees were mailed checks in February. We have three or four clubs that are still waiting on these checks, but for the most part, the clubs who earned them for giving to the GRSP endowment should have received them. If you believe that you should have received a check, but didn't, please let me know and we will find out where your check is.

For those clubs that wish to receive a rebate for next year, it is not too late to get in your donations to make the \$50 per capita in giving that is required to receive an incentive check. A club can ask their trustee for that information or can request from me or the Savannah Office. Any of us would be happy to review what is needed to assure a club some extra funds to be used in whatever way the club desires.

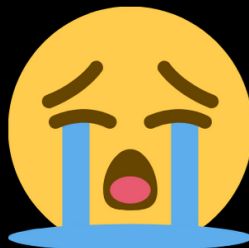

Laws of Life

Georgia Laws of Life Announces State Winners



At Paul Duke STEM High School in Gwinnett County, participation in the Georgia Rotary Clubs sponsored Laws of Life Essay Contest soared from 12 students last year to 718 students for the 2019-2020 contest.

The Georgia Laws of Life Essay Contest announced state winners for the 2019-2020 contest. Cindy Huynh, an 11th grader at Brookwood High School in Snellville, won the competition with her essay about standing up to bullies. Sha'niya Rogers, a 9th grader at Westover High School in Albany, won the George A. Stewart Jr. Character in Action award with her essay about working through homelessness to achieve in school and for her family. Each of these outstanding student writers will receive a \$1,000 prize.

Savannah Johnson, in 11th grade at Lafayette High School, was awarded 1st runner-up. Faith Fitzgerald, a 9th grader at Thomasville High School, won 2nd runner-up. The 3rd runner-up winner was Reagan Beach, a senior at North Cobb High School. Wade Chappell, a 10th grader at North Springs Charter High School, was awarded 4th runner-up. Hyuk Lee, a senior at Lambert High School, won 5th runner-up.

Along with state winners, awards go to 170 school level winners and 53 lead teachers from 72 high schools throughout Georgia. In total, the contest awarded \$21,100 to participating students and teachers. Additional students receive honorable mention recognition. More than 43,000 high school students across Georgia shared their values in a personal, *Law of Life* narrative for this year's essay contest. Georgia Laws of Life will share student winners reading their outstanding essays via social media in the coming weeks.

At Paul Duke STEM High School in Gwinnett County, participation in the Georgia Rotary Clubs sponsored Laws of Life Essay Contest soared from 12 students last year to 718 students for the 2019-2020 contest. The **Rotary Club of Peachtree Corners** partners with the high school for the contest and other programs throughout the school year. Paul Duke principal Dr. Jonathon Wetherington said, "We feel like the Laws of Life Essay is a wonderful instructional opportunity for our students that aligns well with our school's purpose."

Rotary clubs across Georgia conduct the Laws of Life Essay Contest through the nonprofit Georgia Rotary Districts Character Education Program, Inc. (GRDCEP). Rotary club members volunteer to read and judge essays, serve on the contest's Board of Directors, and volunteer their professional expertise to help build character and ethical literacy among students. "The essay contest is an opportunity for Rotarians to illustrate Rotary's *Service Above Self* motto with their community," said Carol Gray, Midtown Atlanta Rotary Club member and Executive Director for GRDCEP.

"The Board of Directors is comprised solely of dedicated Rotarians from all three Georgia Rotary Districts," said Ed Outlaw, Board Chair and member of Peachtree City Rotary Club. "With a recent 3-year, \$230,000 grant from The Templeton Foundation, GRDCEP is growing and seeking volunteers to serve on the board and board committee," continued Outlaw. Muscogee-Columbus Leaps into 5K to Benefit Mercy Med



On leap day 2020, the **Rotary Club of Muscogee-Columbus** hosted its very first 5K run to support a local healthcare organization, Mercy Med. Mercy Med provides healthcare services including medical, dental, counseling, physical therapy and other services to the local community at low or no costs. No one is turned away because of their inability to pay. Nestled in the middle of a lower socioeconomic area, Mercy Med ensures the most vulnerable in our community have access to good health. In addition to healthcare services, the organization also has a robust garden where locals can get fresh, organic fruits and vegetables. For these residents, Mercy Med is the only place for miles to get fresh fruits and vegetables.

So, when Mercy Med was suggested as the 5K beneficiary, the club jumped at the chance to support such a worthwhile organization. Rotarians went right to work planning and executing an amazing inaugural event which gifted Mercy Med with a \$9,310 check! Little did we know that the money raised would soon be put to immediate and necessary use to help Mercy Med fight COVID-19 by serving as the test location for community-wide testing.

At the start of this journey, the Rotary Club of Muscogee-Columbus, a club of 23 members (and growing), would have never guessed that our efforts would aid in tackling what has proven to be the most persistent issue of our time. Now under a shelter-in-place order, the Rotary Club of Muscogee-Columbus continues to search for ways to support our medical community and ease the daily burden felt by COVID-19. Just within the past two weeks, we have provided food to the doctors and nurses of Mercy Med and a local downtown hospital and are having masks produced for a midtown hospital. Rotary Club of Muscogee-Columbus may be a small club but we are mighty in our impact; doing our part to make a difference in our community and in our world.

Lake Spivey-Clayton County Provide Needed Medical Supplies



Rotarians from the **Rotary Club of Lake Spivey/Clayton County** are reacting to the Corona virus not only in the usual way of practicing social distancing, limiting travel only to what is essential, and conducting meetings via Zoom, etc. but also by implementing a major new service project. This project is based on the immediate and profound need for critical supplies such as sanitizer, gloves, and masks as stated by many organizations that are battling the pandemic.

Fellow Rotarian Lata Chinnan and her husband Manjeet provided the catalyst for the new project by offering to match up to \$10,000 in donations designated for the purchase of critical supplies to be given to organizations battling the pandemic. The response has been immediate, on-going, and gratifying. Instead of waiting to collect an arbitrary target amount before obtaining and distributing critical supplies, Rotarians and friends have begun to locate sources for the supplies, to obtain them, and to distribute them even as funds are being donated and matched. Nursing and Rehabilitation Center has come to a door to receive a delivery of gloves and masks. Several other organizations also have received deliveries of critical supplies. These deliveries will continue until the fund has been exhausted and as long as the Club has the ability to locate the supplies.

Marietta Rotarians Flatten COVID-19 Dilemma Facing 80 International Students at Reinhardt University



P.T. Barnum observed, “Without promotion, something terrible happens. . .nothing!”

Nothing, that’s what gnawed at Abigail Merchant’s heart. Abigail, a senior at Reinhardt University in Waleska, GA, along with almost all of Reinhardt’s student body of more than 1700 individuals, was at home embracing the university’s implementation of distance learning. But many of her friends among some 80 international students at Reinhardt couldn’t fly back home for their distance learning and life with family and friends. Instead, they are quarantined in their dorm rooms by the “shelter in place” requirements connected with the COVID-19 virus. Every day these students can get two-bagged meals at the dining hall. Otherwise, they have nothing in the way of additional foodstuffs such as tuna and canned fruits, bottled water, pasta and pasta sauces, frozen fruits and veggies, eggs, deodorants, seasonal allergy medications,

paper towels and toilet paper.

As Abigail discussed this dilemma over the phone with her grandfather Jim Fausett—an Architect, Emeritus Professor and member of the Rotary Club of Marietta—she mused, “Could Rotary help these students?” Jim raised this question to President Chris Bethel during the Club’s ZOOM meeting on April 8. “Absolutely yes” was the immediate response of President Chris that week and President-Elect Mary Ansley Southerland the following week. In the meantime, Jim Peeler, another Rotarian and former Navy veteran, said he and President Chris could coordinate this project’s promotion via video teleconferencing and phone calls with club Rotarians and most importantly with Reinhardt’s Dean of Students Dr. Walter May, Student Health Center campus nurse Kristy Hough and others at the university. A flurry of e-traffic and phone calls ensued in the collection of funds for the “Reinhardt Challenge” grant as it was called. By Monday, April 20, the RC of Marietta raised and sent \$1230 to Reinhardt’s food pantry for needy students. In addition, a large quantity of food and other items collected by Rotarians and others will be delivered to Reinhardt today - May 1.

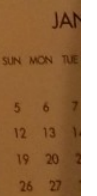
RI Past President Barry Rassin Speaks to Lake Spivey-Clayton County via Zoom
