DGE Cynthia Edwards completed her International Assembly Training a few weeks ago so congrats to her! She also conducted training for district leaders in Peachtree City.

There's so much GOOD going on in the District.

- **Rotary Youth Exchange:** I survived my second Disney chaperoning event with 16 international RYE students from six FL and GA districts! We had all kinds of adventures. (If you want to have a ton of fun and have loads of energy, run around Disney parks for four days straight with 16 15-17 year olds!!) We even had rough weather in Orlando!
- **Service Projects:** I participated in two amazing service project this month with the **Bainbridge Rotary Club** where we teamed up with Salvation Army, Key Club and Anchor Club from Bainbridge High School and fed 650 people in 3.5 hours! Very well done. Additionally, I read to a bunch of third graders at a local elementary school with the **Rotarians of On the Flint!**
- **The Rotary Foundation:** I am so happy with many of our clubs and Rotarians for Foundation and Polio Plus giving excellence. So far, we have total giving of over \$798K with \$363K to Foundation and \$193K to Polio Plus and \$87K in Endowment. We are first in Zone 34 for Polio Plus and in third place overall for Polio Plus. We still have plenty of time to go and lots of opportunity left for 23 clubs that have not given to Foundation yet and 27 to Polio Plus. Please aim to contribute to some of our primary goals. We have another club with \$1M in total giving again. Thanks again; I am helping present a \$1M giving banner to **RC of Alpharetta** this week. Congrats and thanks to Alpharetta! I

also helped recognized three major donors and 1 Major Donor Level 2 at **RC of North Atlanta**. The club also presented a \$12K check to DRFC Bob Hagan.

- **Recognizing Lifetime Achievement:** We gave a lifetime service award to 58-year Rotarian Don Millen of the Rotary Club of North Atlanta - read the story later in this newsletter.
- **Membership:** The district membership team, led by Audley Knight, held a special Discovery Rotary Event with nearly 50 potential future Rotarians. This was all done with money that Jose Gonzalez told us was available to spend on special membership events. We may be doing some more local events. Keep up your good work to grow Rotary.
- **GRSP:** This program for promoting peace through understanding celebrates its 80th anniversary this year - with nearly 4,000 alumni. The GRSP trustees held their winter meeting in January - a special shortened meeting due to inclement weather with important work, as they took time to review finances, select students for the 2026-27 school year, and recognize some donors - including District 6900's own Warren Hamilton Jr. (Will Watt Fellow), Aadu Allpere (Kendall Weisiger Fellow), Bill Dallas (Jake Cheatam Fellow) and PDG Andre Marria (Ronnie Waller Fellow).

District 6900 Opportunity

Showcasing Rotary International at the 2026 FIFA World Cup



Rotary District 6900 has an exciting opportunity to play a visible and meaningful role in one of the world's largest global events—the **2026 FIFA World Cup**, coming to North America from **June 11-July 19, 2026**.

Rotary International is exploring ways to strengthen **Host City Leadership** in key areas that align closely with Rotary's mission, including **hospitality, human trafficking prevention, housing support, event services, and public image**. This effort positions Rotary to demonstrate *Service Above Self* on a global stage.

At the **Rotary Zone Institute 33/34 in Jacksonville**, Rotary International President-Nominee **Larry Lunsford** met with Rotary leaders to learn more about the work of the **Rotary Action Group Against**

Slavery (RAGAS) and to discuss Rotary’s potential involvement in addressing increased human-trafficking risks and broader community needs during the World Cup.

Following these discussions, Rotary International leadership connected project organizers with key members of the RI staff. Collaborative conversations are now underway to explore how Rotary can take a leadership role in:

- Human trafficking awareness and prevention
- Hospitality and visitor engagement
- Housing coordination and community support
- Event service initiatives
- Public image and media outreach

In coordination with **PDG Stephanie Meyer (Kansas City)**, a **one-page overview** has been developed outlining several **subcommittee leadership and service opportunities** for Rotarians across North America. The goal is to ensure that Rotary has a strong, coordinated presence in **every World Cup host city**, as well as to organize **Rotary-led events in host cities prior to the tournament**. These events will bring together Rotarians, community leaders, and anti-trafficking partners to raise awareness and coordinate local action.

For **Rotary District 6900**, this represents a unique opportunity for clubs and individual Rotarians to contribute leadership, expertise, and service—whether through advocacy, education, logistics, or public-facing initiatives. Your involvement can help shape how Rotary is seen and experienced during this historic event.

Our Rotary Foundation

The Foundation’s Work Continues to Reach Further

As usual, there is lots to talk about and share with you all. I had the opportunity to put together some halfway through the year numbers of our DG Steve Ivory and he was extremely excited about where we found ourselves at this point in the year. So let me share them with you now.

For District 6900, our annual fund goal for the year is \$307,000, and as of end of December we are already at \$347,000, which is 113% of the goal. Our Polio Plus goal for the year is \$158,000 and we are already at \$184,000 which is 116%! Not bad for this point in our year. Our endowments are \$233,000. The district has two new Arch Klumph Society members as of now. Special thanks go out to our DG Steve Ivory and Mary Chapman for attaining that level. We now have a total of 11 Arch Klumph Society members in the district.

So where do these great numbers place us among the districts? We currently sit at number 1 in polio giving and are number 3 for our annual fund giving. All accomplished just halfway through the Rotary year. Let's keep this going and keep District 6900 on top!

Let's turn our attention now to how we fare with our Grants. The total available to us this year is \$432,000. We've donated \$55,000 to Polio Plus and invested \$147,000 in district grants. In addition, we invested \$220,000 in global grants with a total of seven clubs participating. There are an additional seven clubs that are waiting that are awaiting approval from Rotary International for \$175,000. Once all is signed, we will have \$35,000 left as a carryover for next year. The district has also helped in other areas, including the Jamaican hurricane relief fund and providing \$22,000 in scholarships. The district has also fared very well in our benefactor and bequest numbers as both are up. Thank you to Lee Hollingsworth who has been extremely successful as our Benefactor Chair.

I do want to turn my attention to an outstanding grant project which has its own separate article in this month's issue, which I highly encourage you to read in its entirety. The grant is co-sponsored by the North Atlanta Club, and it is aimed specifically at the country of Ethiopia. The grant is designed to prevent birth defects associated with Spina Bifida. RI President Arezzo and his wife Anna Maria have taken a personal interest in this project as they are making a trip to Ethiopia visit the project firsthand. Very exciting to have our RI President there. Make sure you read the full article in this month's newsletter for all the

information.

As time and space permits, I hope to highlight more grant projects to help promote continued thought in all our clubs of areas Rotary can continue to make a big difference in our own communities and the world at large.

In Memoriam

Celebrating the Life of Will MacArthur



Rotary's world shines a little less brightly today with the passing of William "Will" MacArthur of Sandy Springs, Georgia—a devoted Rotarian, a joyful servant leader, and a beloved friend to many.

Will's Rotary journey was marked by unwavering dedication and an infectious spirit. Most recently a member of the Rotary Satellite Club of Stone Mountain Passport, he served as Foundation Chair and resident champion of good humor, lifting spirits as naturally as he lifted service projects. Before joining the Passport club, Will contributed profoundly to the Rotary Club of Sandy Springs, where he faithfully served three years as Treasurer, four years as Foundation Chair, and ultimately as Club President in 2017-18. His commitment only deepened after his presidency, as he continued to guide and encourage fellow Rotarians through three years as Assistant Governor, helping clubs across the district reach new heights.

Will's devotion to Rotary extended far beyond the club level. At the District level, he was an indispensable leader for many years. He brought steady stewardship as District Foundation Treasurer for eight years, strengthened connections as District Alumni Chair for three years, and championed global health as Polio Committee Chair for several years. In 2023, his extraordinary service to The Rotary Foundation was honored with the prestigious Citation for Meritorious Service—a recognition befitting a man whose heart beat strongly for Rotary's mission.

Service was not simply something Will believed in; it was something he lived every day. His generosity—of time, talent, and treasure—was boundless. A Benefactor, Bequest Society Level 2 member, Paul Harris Fellow, Major Donor, and ultimately an Arch Klumph Fellow, Will gave with purpose and conviction. His passion for eradicating polio around the world made him a steadfast supporter of the PolioPlus campaign, a cause to which he dedicated countless hours and immeasurable heart.

Beyond the titles and accolades, Will will be remembered for his kindness, his humility, his laughter, and his devotion to making the world better than he found it. Rotary is stronger, gentler, and more joyful because of him.

He leaves behind a legacy of service that will continue to inspire all who had the privilege of knowing him.

GRSP Update

GRSP's Biral, Jin Honored Duo for Thomas Peace Awards



Julia Carlotto Biral of Brazil and **Guang 'Loski' Jin of China** were recently announced as the winners of the 2025-2026 Barbara M. and Donald L. Thomas Peace Award. The awards were presented in December by Rotary Club of Roswell Committee Chair John Carruth, alongside GRSP Executive Director Kathyne Fields and Past District Governor Cheryl Greenway.

Julia attends Oglethorpe University and hosted by the Rotary Club of Dunwoody and was recognized as a "natural-born leader." The committee was moved by her ability to foster deep relationships with her peers and promote peace through her everyday interactions.

"Julia takes charge without imposing," Carruth noted. "She gives us a glimpse of a young woman who promotes peace naturally." The award will assist Julia with the financial challenges of being an international student, helping to cover educational expenses and improve her housing situation so she can focus on her studies and emotional health.

Loski studies at the University of Georgia (UGA) and is hosted by the Rotary Clubs of Madison County, Hartwell, Elberton, and Royston/Franklin County, Loski was honored for his extensive volunteer teaching in China and Nepal and leadership at UGA with the Chinese Students and Scholars Association and the International Student Advisory Board.

"Loski understands that peace begins not with big speeches, but with everyday interactions," said Carruth. "He has fully embraced the GRSP spirit in this final year at Georgia."

The award carries the names of Barbara and Donald Thomas, who became icons in Georgia during the 1980s for their "Anchor Banker" commercials. Following a mission trip to Costa Rica in 2000, the Thomases were inspired to establish this award to support GRSP students in financial need who exemplify

the Rotary motto of "Service Above Self." Since 2002, the Rotary Club of Roswell has administered this annual award, which has grown to two scholarships with \$3,000 per recipient. This year's presentation serves as a powerful reminder of the Thomases' generosity and the 80-year mission of GRSP to create a more peaceful world, one student at a time.

Our Rotary Foundation at Work

R.I. President Arezzo to visit North Atlanta's Global Grant Project in Ethiopia



“When spiders unite, they can tie up a lion” – Ethiopian Proverb

When Rotary International President Francesco Arezzo and wife Anna Maria visit Rotary Ethiopia this month, they will see the **Rotary Club of North Atlanta’s** (RCNA) global grant project first-hand – the sole project chosen for their visit.

Joined by two Rotary clubs in the United States and two in Addis Ababa, the RCNA is beginning the third year of a five-year initiative to prevent serious birth defects such as *spina bifida*, which are associated with a lack of an inexpensive vitamin (B9, or *folic acid*) in maternal diets.

Spina bifida occurs when part of the spinal cord lies outside of the vertebrae. It belongs to a group of related conditions called *neural tube defects* or *NTDs*. Children born with an NTD often die at birth. Even if initially saved by prompt and essential neurosurgery, they may still face a difficult, shortened life with disability.

To prevent this problem, women need sufficient folic acid in their diets **before** they become pregnant and during the first trimester. Those who have already given birth to a child with an NTD face a *10X risk of having another child with these disabilities*, and Ethiopia has one of the highest NTD rates in the world. The tragedy is that some 75% of these birth defects can be prevented by preconception consumption of the vitamin.

The purpose of the global grant project is to provide women who have already had a child with an NTD with supplemental high-dose folic acid tablets initially purchased from a firm in India. The high-risk cohort was identified from the records of local hospitals in Addis Ababa. The program follows these mothers to

determine the effect and impact of the intervention during the program's five-year duration.

The Rotary Club of North Atlanta, RC Addis Ababa Central Mella, and RC Addis Ababa West are distributing over 1.8 million high-dose folic acid supplements, benefiting thousands of women and families in Ethiopia. In the third year, the program will expand to two more hospitals in the Tigray region, totaling six hospitals, with one hospital already having a waiting list of over 780 mothers. So far 2500 women have participated.

The project recently won the "Anna Award" for "Most Impressive Project" at the 2025 District 9212 Conference. Momentum is gaining towards sustainability: folic acid tablets are now being manufactured in Ethiopia, and the country has approved folic acid fortification of wheat and plans to introduce double-fortified salt with iodine and folic acid.

RCNA's hope is that the R.I. president's visit will highlight the need and viability of the project to the world of Rotary - and beyond.

More than two years after writing his Laws of Life essay in 10th grade, Georgia Laws of Life alumnus CJ Allen, linebacker for the University of Georgia Bulldogs, recently reminded us just how lasting one moment of reflection can be.

CJ reposted his essay on Facebook with a simple caption: *“My 10th grade project on Laws of Life. Lol read this. Moral of the story—keep going.”*

His Law of Life — *“Everybody goes through something. It’s all about persevering.”* — reflected on football, self-doubt, and the determination to push forward when others, and even he himself, questioned his ability.

Today, CJ has completed his college career at UGA and is pursuing his dream of playing in the NFL. His story powerfully illustrates that Laws of Life essays aren’t just school assignments—they are defining moments that students carry with them long after graduation, shaping how they face challenges and pursue their dreams.

- North Cobb Rotary Club members joined the city of Acworth to turn the Martin Luther King holiday into a day of service ... participating with the City of Acworth in a unity walk from the Roberts School to the Acworth Community Center.
- Members spent a Saturday painting to kick off the learning center refresh for the Acworth Achievers Program. Its mission is to provide educational assistance, recreational activities, and mentorship while fostering servant-leadership.
