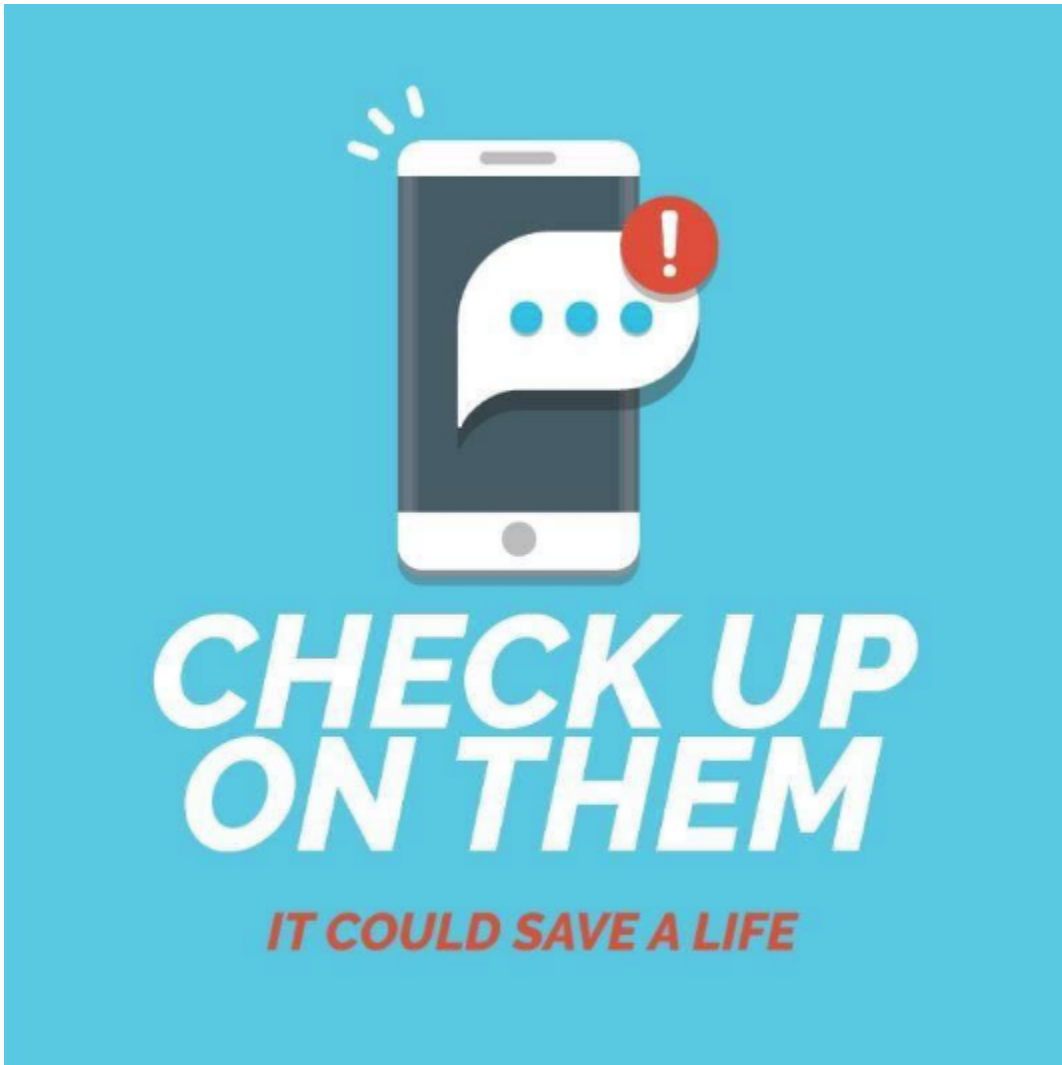
Thomasville Supports Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program

 Five years ago, when Scott Ruck was the president of the Rotary Club of Thomasville, Rotarian Andy Martin approached Ruck and the board of directors to ask for their local financial support of a Morehouse College School of Medicine Teenage Pregnancy Prevention Initiative (TPPI). TPPI is a federally funded initiative designed to reduce teen pregnancy rates and to serve approximately 3,450 middle and high school youth over a five-year period in six Georgia counties.
 With the approval of the board, the club committed \$1,000 in local funding for the TPPI project. In the last four years, succeeding club presidents and their boards recognized the extreme importance of the project and continued the yearly financial support of the initiative. During the five years of the project, the club has given a total of \$15,500, in local support of the TPPI which concluded June 30, 2020. Under the direction of the local Rotary Youth

South DeKalb Presents a Focus on Clean Water Issues ... Join On Zoom



Join the **Rotary Club of South DeKalb** on Zoom on Wednesday, August 12 to hear Rotary Club of South DeKalb environmentalist Dr. Jacqueline Echols talk about the difficulty of solving problems related to the lack of access to clean water. Jacqueline Echols is a tireless advocate for Georgia's watersheds and works for their protection through both policy change and community engagement. She has served as Board President of the South River Watershed Alliance (SRWA) since 2010. As Board President, she has worked to ensure federal and state regulators enforce DeKalb County's National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) sewer overflow permit, help to secure Georgia Department of Natural Resources grant support for the South River Water Trail, and hosted countless river cleanups; kayaking; and other stewardship and conservation events for the local community.

Jackie Echols' work on behalf of the citizens of this state, most particularly those living in DeKalb County and along the South River has been tireless. For example, DeKalb County sanitary sewer spills have huge negative impacts on the county's streams and rivers. They also cost ratepayers hundreds of thousands of dollars each year in federal and state fines and environmental cleanup costs. Jackie has been more than an advocate for the South River. She is a keen strategist who fights to ensure that federal Clean Water Act requirements are enforced.

Under Dr. Echols' leadership, the SRWA became the sole intervener in the consent decree between the United States Environmental Protection Agency and DeKalb County. The projects and work of SRWA are intended to restore and protect the South River for wildlife to thrive and people to enjoy. Restoration is the return of a degraded ecosystem to a close approximation of its remaining natural potential (U.S. EPA). According to Dr. Echols, urban areas are where most people live and where waterways like the South

River are most threatened. Restoration of the South River depends on actively engaging individuals and communities through projects that raise awareness, educate, and connect people to the river.

The club also posted this in July: "On November 3, 1957, 80 Atlanta ministers published a manifesto on the front page of the Atlanta Journal Constitution addressing racial tension and integration. "Hatred and scorn for those of another race, or for those who hold a position different from our own, can never be justified. It is only as we approach our problems in a spirit of mutual respect of charity, and of good will that we can hope to understand one another, and to find the way to a cooperative solution of our problems." One of the authors was Reverend Bevel Jones, who six months later, on May 8, 1958, would become a charter member of the newly formed Rotary Club of Atlanta West End. "

District Grant Creates Rotary Learning Lab in North Fulton



HomeStretch is a non-profit that helps families with school age children who are employed with transitional housing. As part of the program they help residents with job skills and their children with tutoring so they can be successful in school.

The **Rotary Club of Roswell** partnered with the **Rotary Clubs of North Fulton and Milton** on a grant that will provide HomeStretch with an onsite computer lab that children will use with their tutors to complete school assignments and further their education. Currently, students have to travel to another

site to receive tutoring. As you can imagine, with working parents and limited resources this is often difficult. Do to child safety and regulations tutors are not allowed in the residences at HomeStretch.

The Rotary Learning Lab will provide a common area for tutors to meet with students and provide the much needed leg up they need to get ahead in life. Once installed the shipping container will be transformed into the Rotary Learning Lab and painted Rotary blue. In addition to providing a great assist to HomeStretch this project will be a lasting symbol of Rotary's great work in our community as everyone who visits the lab will see the Rotary Learning Lab branding.

Between our club members and their connections to the trades we have volunteers who are excited to contribute to this project. Millard Architects, WS Nielsen Company, Choate Construction, Moncrief HVAC, Meer Electric, Kee Designs, Civil Logistics, Lummus Building Supply and more have donated their products or services to this project. These partners have allowed us to turn a \$10,000 District Grant into a \$100,000+ project.

Atlanta Metro Rotary Club Featured in Rotarian Magazine



Change agents

SPANNING THE AGES:

Atlanta-area Rotarians have a long-standing focus on youth. Their robust RYLA infrastructure and a state-of-the-art student leadership program for interdistrict exchange are hallmark efforts. Looking to the future, the National Day of Service gave rise to the nascent Rotary Club of Atlanta Metro.

Despite playing an active role as a past president of the Rotaract Club of Atlanta, Alisha Rodriguez assumed that her demanding job would preclude joining a Rotary club. Rodriguez had heard that a lot of Rotary clubs required a large time commitment and that new members often "would get thrown into committees and get overworked," she says.

To David Gordon and Warren Turner, then members of the Rotary Club of Dunwoody with long involvement in guiding the Rotaractors, Rodriguez's apprehensions were familiar. So Gordon and Turner took action, enlisting Rodriguez and others to charter the new club. "Some of them came from Rotaract and some were friends of Rotaractors," says Turner. "We circled back with Rotarians from our club who had left. They found this type of model more accommodating and appealing."

To make the service and club commitments manageable, the club emphasizes volunteer partnerships. "We have structured volunteer opportunities by building relationships with other organizations," rather than inaugurating projects from scratch, says Rodriguez.

"The only charity we encourage members to support financially is The Rotary Foundation," says Gordon. "We support other charities with manpower, intellectual as well as physical." The club works with some of those charities in conjunction with the Rotaract club and other Rotary clubs.

An informal mentoring system is in its infancy, but Gordon already has seen strong bonds forged. "We've just started it,

pairing people slowly but surely," he says. The older members also learn from the younger members, Turner says. "The younger people are much more comfortable with emerging technologies. They probably prefer email. They prefer Slack." Rodriguez finds a balance between the young members and the older members, she says. As a smaller club, it has advantages, she says. "It's a trap that a lot of Rotary clubs come across is you tend to bond with the same group of people," he says. "Here, because we're a smaller club, you're forced to talk to everybody. It's about having a conversation, listening to what's important to people."

The club meets twice a month but has sometimes replaced a regular meeting with a fellowship session at different locations, such as an upscale pub with bowling. The club has often held social events at a hotel that, despite its location in Atlanta's trendy Buckhead area, charged the club only \$100 for its event space. And a joint meeting with the Atlanta Rotaract club is held every two months.

"It's a less formal club and people really enjoy it. It's a group of friends and we try to keep it that way," says Gordon. "We're spending a lot of time making sure that our members are happy and that they want to join in."

The 20th annual **Atlanta Rotary Club** trip to rural Honduras is scheduled for March 6 through 13, 2021, pending the reopening of Honduras to foreign visitors. Rotarians from other clubs are welcome to join the trip.

According to Rotary International, the Atlanta club's trip is the largest Rotary club sponsored mission trip in the world, averaging more than 50 travelers each spring. The group has built schools and continues to work on education, healthcare, economic development and water projects each year.

The core of the group is from the Rotary Club of Atlanta, but members from all over the state and the South have been on trips. Notable Rotarians from other clubs include Paul Ray from **Alpharetta** who leads the clean water project, Lynn Clarke from **Bremen** who maintains school computers, and Vince Dooley from **Athens** who has the school soccer field named for him. Regular travelers from the Atlanta club include Bob Hope, who organizes the trip, Blake McBurney, Dave Moody, Clark Dean, John Lucht, Mike Passilla, David Allison and Paul Morris, among others. Each year the group delivers enough medicines on its trip to cover the medical needs of the rural Agalta Valley for a year. The group has raised and donated over \$2 million to support education in the Agalta Valley.

Thomasville Supports Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program

Five years ago, when Scott Rich was the president of the **Rotary Club of Thomasville**, Rotarian Andre' Marria approached Rich and the board of directors to ask for their local financial support of a Morehouse College School of Medicine Teenage Pregnancy Prevention Initiative (TPPI). TPPI is a federally funded initiative designed to reduce teen pregnancy rates and to serve approximately 3,450 middle and high school youth over a five-year period in six Georgia Counties. Thomas and Grady counties were two of the counties served. TPPI strives to:

- Reduce teenage pregnancy and births
- Reduce sexually transmitted infections among adolescents
- Implement selected evidence-based curricula with fidelity
- Increase student bonding to school and academic performance
- Increase Community Awareness of Teen Pregnancy Prevention and Positive Youth Development Programs

With the approval of the board, the club committed \$3,000 in local funding for the TPPI project. In the next four years, succeeding club presidents and their boards recognized the extreme importance of the project and continued the yearly financial support of the initiative. During the five years of the project, the club has given a total of \$15,500. in local support of the TPPI which concluded June 30, 2020. Under the direction of the local Rotary Youth Services committee the Thomasville Rotary Club secured an additional \$3500 in local funding through a Rotary District Grant. Total local funding provided TPPI during the life of the grant has been \$19,000.

During that five years, 7,500 teens were served by the program. Of the 7,500 teens served, no pregnancies were reported and five of the teens began their college careers. T

Nationally the grant is funded through the Federal Department of Health and Human Services and administered through the federal Office of Adolescent Health. The grant was awarded locally to the Margaret Neel Williams Boys and Girls Club with responsibility of reporting to a local Fidelity Manager on behalf of Morehouse.

A unique outcome of the grant was the formation of the MNWBGC Youth Leadership Council. The grant required the YLC be formed from graduates of the TPPI. Teens could not be a member of the YLC unless they had completed one of three Abstinence or HIV curriculums taught by TPPI.

The overall design of the program encompasses teen education encouraging personal responsibility regarding the actions and health of teenagers.

Currently, the grant is in a period of 'Sustainability.' The Rotary Club of Thomasville will continue to financially support the program in 2020-2021.
