

## **Rotary Partners in Farmers-to-Families Food Box Program**

Rotary District 6900, in partnership with Rotary District 6910, was given a huge opportunity to help alleviate food insecurity for counties with a designated Federal Opportunity Zone. In October, the USDA Farmers-to-Families Food Box project delivered an entire truckload of refrigerated food boxes to be distributed under the direction of a Rotary Club and food pantry at no cost, alleviating any financial burden to the food pantry. Each truckload included 1,156 boxes or the equivalent of 23,000 meals. The 30-pound boxes included over five pounds of meat, 12 pounds of produce, pounds of dairy and one gallon of milk. Thanks to the clubs in the district that participated and to AG Chris Brand for coordinating the overall effort - seven trucks carrying 8,000+ boxes, for a total of 161,000 meals weighing in at 224,000 pounds.

- On October 22, the **Rotary Club of Americus** collaborated with Harvest of Hope Food Pantry to host a massive food distribution event was held in the parking lot of First Baptist Church. Residents of Sumter County could drive through and pick up food and other items, as well as the boxes of refrigerated food procured by Rotary. Additionally, Harvest of Hope added bags with chicken thighs, small hams, orange juice, toilet paper, and a variety of additional items. Nearly 70 volunteers were on site to provide assistance, logging a cumulative 216 hours. In addition to Americus Rotarians, GSW athletes and nursing students, employees from The Staffing People, First Baptist Church, and community volunteers were on hand to ensure each family was served. The Rotary Club of Americus would like to thank Harvest of Hope Food Pantry, First Baptist Church, Georgia Cold Storage, Minor Farms, Steve Stanfield, and Jerry Dill for their help in getting food into the hands of Sumter County families.
- The **Rotary Clubs of Carrollton, Carrollton Dawnbreakers** and **Bremen** joined forces to distribute to families in Haralson, Carroll, and surrounding areas.
- The **Rotary Club of Newnan** collaborated with Bridging the Gap, Real Life Center, I-58 Mission, One Roof and Meals on Wheels to distribute a truckload to Coweta County residents. In *The Newnan Times-Herald*, the director of Bridging the Gap said, "We see Rotary as a valued partner in our mission to help people in Coweta County as they struggle with food insecurity and lack of connection to available resources. This gift of food will go a long way to feeding, serving and supporting their restoration."
- In Crisp County, families received an amazing "Halloween treat" with **Cordele Rotarians** gathering early in the morning to participate in the distribution. You can see the cars lined up in the field hosting the event.
- Other sponsoring clubs included **South DeKalb Rotary Club and Stone Mountain/Tucker/East Cobb, Camilla/Dougherty County, and Lake Spivey/Clayton County.**



#### **Your 2019-20 Giving**

District 6900 continues to be a generous supporter of The Rotary Foundation. In the 2019-20 Rotary year that ended in June, our total giving as a District totaled **\$978,23**3. That includes:

- Annual fund giving of \$670,070
- Polio donations of \$180,738
- Endowment fund giving of \$84,500
- Other donations totaling \$42,925

Special recognition goes to our top three per capita giving clubs for the year:

- 1. **Muscogee-Columbus** at an average of \$1,947.18 per member
- 2. **Emory Druid Hills** at \$1,803.57 per member
- 3. **Alpharetta** at \$818.31 per member.

Rotary Foundation Dollars Power Our Work at Home and Around the World

In the 2019-20 Rotary year that ended June 30, District 6900 received money from The Rotary Foundation based on our annual fund giving in the 2016-17 Rotary year. As a result, we were able to invest \$476,000 in Global Grant projects, scholars and disaster relief, and an additional \$162,308 in district grants to our clubs who in turn made a difference in their communities. Two of those district grants are featured in this newsletter - one allowed the **Rotary Club of Griffin Daybreak** to donate 10 educational tablets to its school district to support remote learning and another helped the **Rotary Club of Senoia** support our veterans. And there are many more stories like that - locally and around the world - thanks to your creativity in identifying projects, The Rotary Foundation's financial support, and your generosity in supporting the Foundation.

In this newsletter, you can also read about one of recent Global Grant Scholars, Jasmine Burton, who has just been named one of the Top 40 under 40 by the Georgia Tech Alumni Association for her work in bring sanitation (toilets) to places in Africa. And look at two of the Global Grant projects we're working on for this Rotary year - in our new "Through Rotary's International Window" feature. It's exciting to know that we can invest in young people who are already starting to make a difference in the world, and that we can work together to achieve great things in the Rotary Foundation's seven areas of focus.

We are beginning a brand new column for the District Newsletter during Foundation Month. With dual goals of showcasing District 6900's International Service projects and helping every club become involved in this high impact Avenue of Service, we are eager to show you Rotary's International Window.

Our Windows view includes:

- Global Grants, the ones in progress and the ones under development
- Global Grant Scholarships with past and present recipient activities
- International service projects undertaken by individuals and Clubs in our District not funded through the Foundations Grant Process.

Kicking off our "Through the Window" column, we are feature two different Global Grant Projects, both sharing Partner Clubs inside this District, and both needing financial and maybe "hands on" technical assistance from other Clubs and individual Rotarians.

- Global Grant Proposal #1 envisions clean water and a sanitation program (WASH) in 100 remote village households of approximately 2000 people in Panama. The Project is budgeted at approximately \$65,000 total and they are planning to initiate work in Rotary Year 2020-2021. The Rotary Club of Roswell will be District 6900's International Partner Club you can read more about this project and funding needs on the district website. Please contact Kay Love in the Roswell Club for more information about the help they hope to have from us.
- Global Grant #2 offers training and equipment supporting the development of a vocational training center on "Heart for Africa's" farm school orphanage in Eswatini (formerly Swaziland). District 6900's International Partner Club is the Rotary Club of North Fulton who is looking for funding assistance with a \$150,000 budget. Yyou can read more about this project and funding needs on the district website.. Please contact North Fulton Past President and Foundation Director Mike Mudd for more information and donations.

When your Club chooses to support Global Grant applications like the ones shown here, it will be credited with Global Grant participation and District 6900 will match the Club's monetary contribution \$1 for \$1 through our Annual District Designated Funds. When a Global Grant Application is approved by The Rotary Foundation and accepted, the Foundation adds another \$1 for \$1 match for all the money pledged from District 6900 and the Clubs.

Without a doubt, we are making an incredible investment in the World's Future – "Through Rotary's International Window." If you have opportunities or are looking for one, you may always contact me, Anne Glenn, your Global Grants chair.

Jasmine Burton Named One of Georgia Tech's Top 40 under 40



We are proud to report that Georgia Tech alumnus and former Global Grant Scholar Jasmine Burton was recently named one of the Top 40 Under 40 for 2020. Sponsored by District 6900 and the Rotary Club of Dunwoody, Jasmine now serves as CEO, Executive Director and Founder of Wish WASH.

The Georgia Tech Alumni magazine for Fall 2020 says: "Jasmine Burton is not afraid to break the silence surrounding taboo topics like toilets in order to bring innovative solutions to global water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH). In 2014, she was part of the first all-female team to win the Georgia Tech InVenture Prize competition for a modular toilet that was designed to help the nearly 2.6 billion people who lacked access to hygienic bathrooms. As the founder of Wish for WASH, which seeks to bring innovation to sanitation and hygiene with a gender equity lens, Jasmine has led iterative toilet innovation pilots and research across sub-Saharan Africa and in Atlanta-based resettled refugee communities. "I identify as a social impact designer who seeks to utilize design thinking and business acumen to build a more inclusive world," she says.

Fun fact: She's summited Mount Kilimanjaro and is a traditional dancer of the Nanticoke Nation with the tribal name Bright Smiling Sage."

#### Planning for 2020-21

I know that Rotarians throughout the District miss having "GRSPs" in our Club meetings, at our socials, and engaged in our service projects. Here's a picture of our most recent GRSP class (2019-2020) last summer at Georgia Southern University, just to remind us of these amazing young people!

However, Clubs and host families and Trustees are in communication with our alumni around the world on a weekly, if not daily, basis. Case in point: when I left of Club meeting today (week 2 of in-person meetings – with masks, sanitizer and social distancing) I walked out with our 2019-2020 GRSP host. Ian: "Have you spoken with Michaela recently?" Mac: "I texted her yesterday evening so we could talk, but realized it was 2 am in Sweden. So as soon as I get home I'm calling her." Multiply this across the District... well you get the picture.... GRSP global friendships are alive and well.

A couple of weeks ago we welcomed DG Kirk Driskell to Columbus. I appreciated being able to spend some time with Kirk to update him on where we are in planning for the GRSP class of 2021-2022. Here are some of the key points we discussed:

- 1. GRSP plans to host a class of 2021-2022; but this is dependent on outside factors such as falling COVID rates globally, opening up of international borders and travel, ability to obtain visas, policies regarding international students by the US Department of Education and USG, etc.
- 2. State-wide 33 of the 45 students accepted for the class of 2020-2021 have told us they would still to come in 2021-2022, and most of the Clubs and host families want them to come.
- 3. New applications for 2021-2022 are now closed. We have received 65 new applications (more than I expected!). Clubs whose 2020-2021 students are among those who do not want to come next year PLUS Clubs that were no planning to host this year, but plan to host in 2021-2022 will be able to select from this pool of applicants.

- 4. Some Clubs in the District are also considering the "pilot program" method of selection that proved very successful in 2019-2020 in its pilot year in District 6900. It resulted in GRSP's first ever student from Ethiopia plus more controlled costs for the host Club. Please contact your Trustee for information on how the pilot program works.
- 5. Rotarians continue to make contributions to the GRSP Foundation thank you District 6900!

#### **Thomasville Dedicates Memorial to GRSP Founder**



Friday afternoon, October 16, members of the **Thomasville Rotary Club** and others toured the Marriott Courtyard Hotel under construction at the corner of Dawson and Remington streets in Thomasville, Georgia. Developers of the new hotel are allowing Georgia Rotary to help design the entry plaza as a tribute to the Georgia Rotary Student Program (GRSP) and the fountain as a memorial to the GRSP founder.

GRSP was founded by Thomasville, Georgia resident and Rotarian and Past District Governor William A. (Will) Watt. Having seen the damage of war in Europe, he founded the organization in the spring of 1946 at the end of WWII as a way to support world peace. It was his belief that "Peace through understanding" would be possible if students from foreign countries came to Georgia colleges and universities to study and develop a better understanding of their fellow man.

Each year, GRSP students from all over the world come to Georgia to study. These students make friends and learn about differing cultures and lifestyles. Georgia Rotarians believe "Peace is Possible," through GRSP as the organization promotes international goodwill through friendship and understanding. The students become adopted members of a Georgia "host family," living on-campus at the college or university they attend. GRSP is an ambassadorial scholarship program.

Since the founding, 3,791 students have participated in the GRSP program from all around the world. Rotary members in Rotary Districts 6900, 6910, and 6920 have donated over \$12,000,000 to GRSP. The hotel plaza will be named the GRSP Peace Plaza with the theme, GRSP Generations of Generosity. The

DeKalb County students are sequestered at home, taking lessons online. This is very challenging for the students and their families. Deprived of normal social contact, some children are experiencing isolation, depression, and impaired learning during critical development stages.

You can help to make a positive impact in the lives of these children in our community by donating just a little of your time.

I'm aware of two opportunities presented through the South DeKalb Improvement Association Education (SDIAE):

- 1. Young students need reading assistance, as part of a "Book Buddy Program" click to see **the flier**. It involves at least a two-month commitment to read for 1/2 hour, one to three times per week.
- 2. Some students (a wide range of ages) need tutoring help with specific subjects. This involves a minimum of one hour commitment, once a week. I've attached a spreadsheet with specific information, entitled "Mercy Housing SE OST Tutoring List." Some of the students have already been matched with tutors, as indicated under the Notes column. Approximately eight students are awaiting a match. The interactions with students will be virtual (via Zoom).

The coordinator for both volunteer opportunities is Ms. Ella Davis of the SDIAE: Anyone wishing to sign up or learn more should contact her directly: Ms. Ella Davis, South DeKalb Improvement Association Home: (770) 987-3506, Work: (404) 626-3780, Email: davisella@bellsouth.net.

Like most school systems everywhere, DeKalb County has a policy that anyone working with children must undergo a background check. The fingerprinting requirement for virtual interaction has been waived, but the qualification process is still essential. Note that you don't have to be a resident of DeKalb County or Georgia to participate. The number to call for the background check is 770-724-7740. Press 4, and ask the clerk for a background check form. The clerk will USPS the form to the requester. It must be completed and returned via mail with a money order or cashiers check for \$20. The entire process takes about two weeks, so the sooner, the better. It is what it is.

Because of the urgent need, Ms. Davis' organization is willing to purchase certified checks (ahead of time) to meet that requirement and save folks from having to make a trip to the bank or post office. That's a very thoughtful and generous accommodation. However, their funds aren't unlimited. I would like to encourage people to reimburse the SDIAE for the \$20 expense and perhaps make an additional donation via their website at: www.sdiae.org.

VIRTUAL RACE: AUGUST 8 & 9, 2020

On August 8 at 8 am, President Ray Gadd of the **Vinings Cumberland Rotary Club** sent an email blast to start the 2020 VIRTUAL 5K RACE - the 24th year of the Vinings Down Hill 5k - "Run for the Kids." By the time the virtual race ended at 11:59 pm on August 9, the club raised over \$100,000 for children's charities.

The virtual race drew 343 participants from 18 states and seven countries. Those participants and the club's 21 committee members rose to support our Vinings Cumberland community where needs are exponentially higher this year:

- The foster care facility is reaching out for food a basic need.
- The Good Samaritan Health Center personally requested basic medical supplies.
- Kids who are dealing with AIDS, whether their own or of a parent, have a level of stress that's unfathomable.
- Many of the boys and girls living among us are at "home" feeling they are no good, don't matter and

- have no hope. They don't even have ANY in-school days with wonderful teachers and peers who could uplift their spirits and build their self-esteem.
- The Canine Companion charity, supported by the Dog Dash portion of the race, is overwhelmed with training needs.

The success of this race started with Charles Heinz, 24 years ago, Through hard work and constant tweaking of the race, the eventually became a Peachtree Road Race Qualifier and has carried on even after Charles died of cancer on March 3.

As any good Rotarian knows, it is easy to fill the big shoes of a truly committed Rotarian with a vision. What? Wait a minute. It was NOT easy. Yes, Charles had the race down to a well-oiled machine right down to race day where the Vinings Cumberland Rotary Club started showing up in the dark pre-dawn to set up parking, the course, participant check-in, sponsor tents, T-Shirts, snacks, and a really fun area with a great local DJ getting kids dancing and hoola hooping in the Vining's Jubilee.

But this year was, well, it was the "somewhat blind" leading a "blind" race committee, who was faced with the pandemic and needed to recruit new members to the committee, decide if the race should be canceled this year, and explaining what a VIRTUAL race is when we had not known that such a thing even existed prior to hearing the name. A great deal of time was spent encouraging others and trying to engage people of all ages to participate in this effort.


The Pope High School Interact Club helped with hats, tee-shirts and swag, and we reached out to Rotary Youth Exchange and other International students for participation in the run.



# Dr. Palamalai Mahizhnan, Rotary Club of Lake Spivey/Clayton County



On June 25, 2020, when Palamalai Mahizhnan, MD died, the **Rotary Club of Lake Spivey/Clayton County**, the region we serve, and the broader world of Rotary lost a respected citizen, a humble and generous friend, and a quietly effective leader. About eight years ago, PM, which we called him for ease of pronunciation, was diagnosed with a crippling illness for which there is no cure. PM accepted the diagnosis with his usual positive attitude. An oncologist, he continued his medical practice until about a year and a half ago. He also continued his participation in Rotary until only a few months ago, including attending several of our virtual meetings on Zoom. He is survived by his wife of 40 years, Ms. Karpagam Mahizhnan, and a daughter, Ms. Madhavi Mahizhnan, of Louisville, Kentucky.

PM graduated from Thanjavoor Medical College, an affiliate of the University of Madras in India, at the top of his class, followed by a residency in pathology at Harlem Hospital of Columbia University, New York, another residency in internal medicine, and then a fellowship in hematology and oncology at the Medical College of Georgia, after which he established his practice—serving Atlanta's Southern Crescent for 35 years. In describing the work of Dr. PM, a physician colleague said, "Most of the physicians in this area sought his help to take care of themselves and their families.... He saved a lot of lives with his expert and compassionate care – including someone near and dear to me.... Dr. PM embodied the true spirit of a physician, dedicated to the art of healing his whole life.

At the personal level, colleagues describe him as friendly to all, available when needed, and interested in things and events he encountered. As a hobby, for example, he studied ancient texts in the Tamil language, the mother tongue of Tamilnadu, which is the region of India where he was born in 1949. PM also became a world traveler but correspondingly, to quote a colleague, "he chose to live in a modest home all his life, did not drive flashy cars." Instead, he became a philanthropist, but always quietly, never seeking attention for his generosity. In doing so, he donated frequently to charities in his home country of India, supporting individuals for their educational needs, and also in America where in addition to other generous acts he became a Rotary Foundation Level Four Bequest Donor, meaning he provided the Rotary Foundation a \$100,000.00 gift in his will.

When PM made the Level Four commitment in such an authentic and quiet way and in the context of how he has lived in other circumstances, he provided an important incident of leadership by example. Our Foundation Director has commented that soon after PM made his commitment, several other club members expressed interest in being Bequest donors. PM truly demonstrated a life of generous friendship, service above self, and quiet leadership.
