Moving Fire and Radio Waves To Celebrate Independence—Rotary is There!

On 13 September 1921, the countries of Costa Rica, El Salvador, Honduras, Guatemala and Nicaragua declared their independence from Spain. Initially, it was riders on horseback carrying the news of independence. More recently—dating back to 1964—these countries annually celebrate this monumental declaration of freedom during the month of September with ceremonies and athletic runners carrying flaming torches over the region's primary and secondary roads.
This bi-centennial year, the torch of independence in Nicaragua is to be handed to Costa Rica's Minister of Education, Rafael Carriz at Pácul Balsa, Costa Rica on 13 September. When the flame arrives in Alajuela the next day, Rotarians and Rotaract members in the Rotary Club of Alajuela continue running the torch relay. From Alajuela the torch travels to the country's present capital, San José, and on to Costa Rica's old colonial capital, Cartago, where President Carlos Alvarado Quesada has named 2020 Olympian Keith Kenna-Tenney to light a large cauldron.

From Our District Governor

Grow More, Do More



This month, I'd like to focus on Rotary International's two top priorities – membership growth and continuing our work to eradicate polio.

Grow More: To increase our impact in our communities and the world, membership growth is important and the #1 internal priority for Rotary International and our district. At this point in the year, we have 30 clubs with net growth of 1% or more. Congratulations to the clubs leading the way in net membership growth since July 1, 2021:

Club	Number of New Members	Percentage Growth
Johns Creek-North Fulton	10	34%
Bremen	4	22%
Carrollton DawnBreakers	9	16%
Camilla	5	12%
Midtown Atlanta	3	4%
Thomasville	4	3%
Griffin	3	3%

Unfortunately we have 27 clubs with 0% growth and another 11 clubs **declining** in membership. With a quarter of the year behind us, over 50% of our clubs have no **net** growth and this is our number 1 priority.

Every member is on the membership committee! We know from recent surveys that the top three reasons individuals leave Rotary is because they don't feel comfortable in the club, the financial commitment and/or the time commitment.

Do any of these issues apply to your club? Does your club have a goal and plan for membership growth? On average most clubs will lose 10% to 15% of their membership each year because of things they have no control over like death or relocation. What is the membership trend in your club? Need to change your trend? There are many ways we can all work together to grow more. Need ideas? The district membership team and other district leaders can help. Just ask!

Do More - World Polio Day

On a different note, I am looking forward to World Polio Day on October 24 – and encourage all our clubs to participate with an event and make a donation to the End Polio Now campaign. 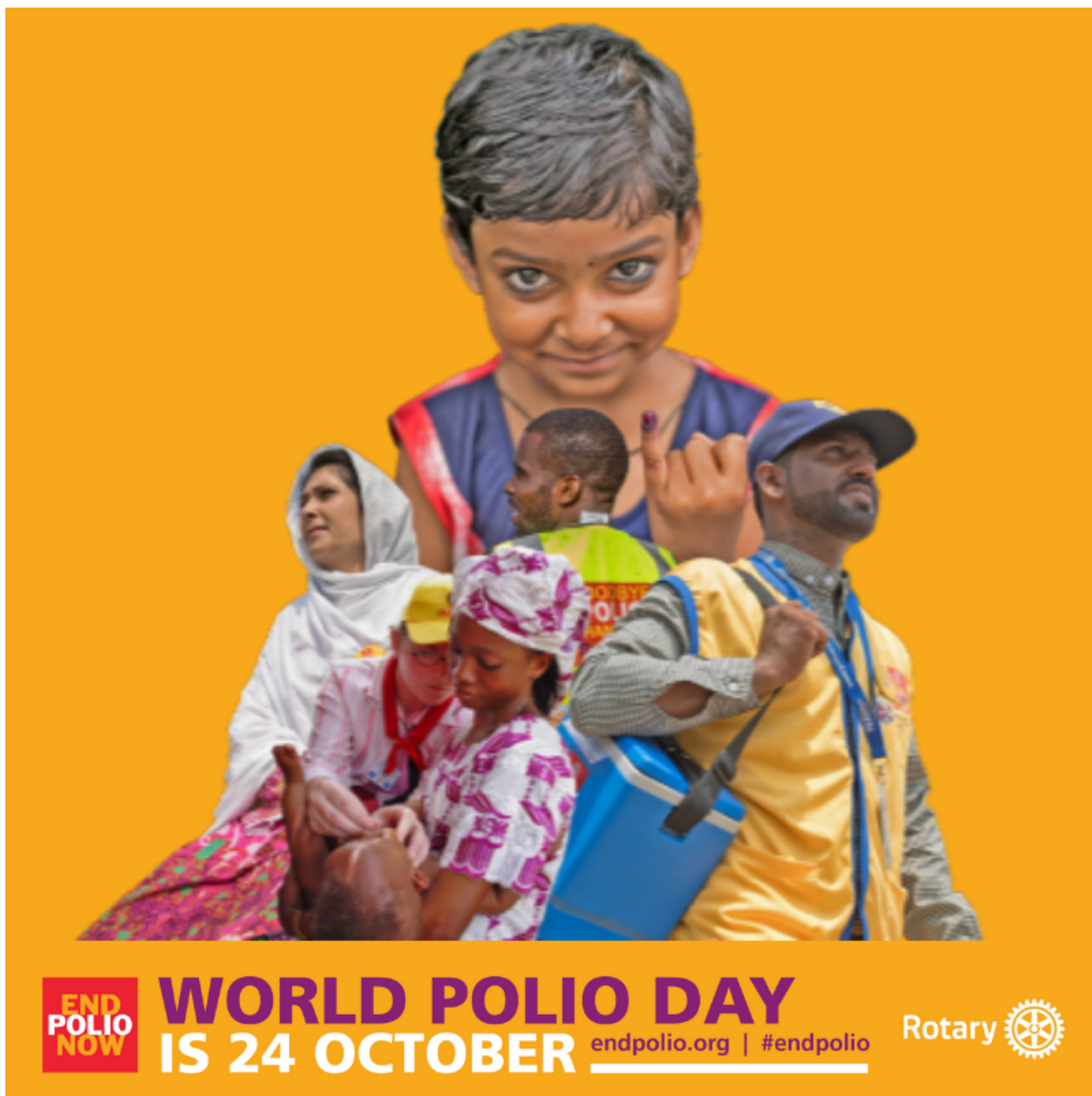

GRSP Update

GRSP Scholarship for 2022-23 International Students - Application Deadline is October 31

SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION DEADLINE: October 31, 2021

**For International Student Applicants 18-25 Years Old, Single;
Not hold citizenship or dual citizenship of the USA;
Not have previously studied in the USA for more than 4 months.
Must be sponsored by a Rotary Club from home country.**

Are you in touch with a former Georgia Rotary Student Program (GRSP) participant to encourage them to share this opportunity in their home country? Do you have family or friends who are international college students? The GRSP scholarship application is open and the deadline is October 31.

Students from around the world apply each year for this amazing cultural experience. GRSP's ambassadorial scholarship is focused on education and cultural enrichment. The GRSP standard selection scholarship pays all scholastic costs, including tuition, a book allowance (\$500), dormitory and meal plan. Students are responsible for covering all transportation expenses to and from the United States, medical insurance costs and any income taxes imposed on non-scholarship income by the U.S. Treasury.

It is important for students to research and ask questions early to make sure they understand all of their

financial obligations. Students need to be prepared to bring \$3,000 in reserve to cover personal expenses throughout the year as host families are not expected or prepared to support the student in any way financially throughout the year.

If accepted into the program, recipients will be extended a one-year (August to May), non-degree seeking scholarship to a college or university here in Georgia. Students do not get to select the school they attend as that is determined by the host Rotary club(s). Students will live on campus in a dormitory, but will have a host family who will support and guide them. Students get to spend time on weekends, breaks and holidays with their host family. GRSP does not contemplate an “exchange” of students, and there is no obligation in return for another country to accept any students from the United States. All we expect is that students come to fully engage, learn and share with Georgia Rotarians in an effort to help us expand peace, international goodwill and understanding around the world.

If an applicant’s parents or friend of the family is in Rotary, ask their clubs to sponsor as the sponsorship is a recommendation, not a requirement. If a student meets our requirements, embraces our mission and is all-in for a life-changing adventure, GRSP encourages them to apply. Please note the October 31 deadline and check the website - <https://grsp.org/students> - for scholarship requirements and necessary information to accompany the application..

In January 2020, I submitted an article for the District Newsletter thanking the Rotary Club of Thomasville for hosting a wonderful RLI event. I talked about all of the upcoming RLI opportunities around the RLI Sunshine Division. In District 6900 we were planning to host RLI in Columbus in May 2020. Then came COVID. The Sunshine Division voted not to hold any in-person RLI events through the end of 2020. The Sunshine Division, thanks in large part to PDG Margie Kersey, began rolling out online RLI, which has been very successful. If you are interested in RLI, but cannot attend an in-person event, online RLI is for you. Parts 1, 2 and 3 are available in one to two hour Zoom meetings. It is a great opportunity to virtually meet Rotarians from all over Georgia, Florida, and the Caribbean. I love being an online Discussion Leader – I learn so much from the participants. Online RLI courses are offered at various times, with each session being offered once or twice each month.

As successful as RLI has been via Zoom, I have truly missed our in person events. District 6900 was the first in the Sunshine Division to host an in-person event. In June 2021 the **Rotary Club of Peachtree City** hosted a stand alone Graduate Course. It was great getting back to the in-person meeting. Being face to face and interacting with other District 6900 Rotarians again was awesome.

We currently have two in-person RLI events scheduled in District 6900. On December 4, 2021, the **Rotary Club of Barnesville** will host RLI at Gordon State College. We are planning to hold Parts 1, 2 and 3, and hope to also hold Graduate Membership and Graduate Facilitation Techniques. If you've attended RLI online you can still come to an in-person event. If you have finished Part One online, you are eligible to move on to Part Two. If you have finished Parts One and Two online, you are eligible to attend Part Three. And if you've graduated from RLI online, we would welcome you in one our Graduate courses.

The **Rotary Club of Thomasville** will once again host RLI on January 15, 2022. I began this letter talking about Thomasville. To be back there after two years is going to be amazing. Registration is open for

Barnesville and Thomasville, as well as dozens of online opportunities.

I hope to see you online, or even better in lovely Barnesville, Georgia on December 4. Head over to www.rlitraining.org and register for RLI. Don't miss these awesome opportunities to grow as a Rotarian and a leader.

Laws of Life

Luncheon Kicks Off 2021-22 Laws of Life Essay Contest



Last month, over 40 educators and Rotarians from across Georgia gathered at the annual Teacher & Rotarian Workshop Luncheon hosted by Georgia Rotary Clubs Laws of Life Essay Contest to kick off the 2021-2022 Contest. We gathered at the Emory Conference Center Silverbell Pavilion for a program which provided inspiration, information, and optimism for the future of our outstanding student writers.

As GLL Board Member Darlene Drew led the workshop, she honored the participating teachers as she shared poignant stories of a beloved teacher of her own. Darlene introduced video of State Winner and Bainbridge High School graduate Corbin Austin reading his poignant essay which included the law, "True happiness comes from making others happy."

District 6900 DGE George Granade expressed gratitude to the teachers as well as the Rotary Clubs

participating in the contest, noting that Student Recognition events held by clubs that partner with a local high school to honor the school's winning students often become a favorite program for the club building greater connection between the members and the students.

GLL Program Manager Linda Hatten reinforced the impact that the contest has on students and school communities as an effective tool for Social and Emotional Learning, saying that "writing a Laws of Life essay helps a student realize that they have power and wisdom within themselves to work through difficult, unexpected, and sometimes painful experiences in life. She also gave an overview of the key points of the contest and introduced two teachers who serve as school contest chairs: Amanda Howell of Rome High School and Jessica Allen of Bremen High School. Amanda and Jessica shared their perspectives on how the Laws of Life Essay Contest serves a vital role in fostering student growth as writers and as individuals. Jessica then introduced video of Bremen Grade Winner Jordan Heidorn reading his essay with his personal law, "Amplify what makes you you."

Wrapping up the workshop, GLL Board Director Beth McIntyre reminded the audience of the Georgia Laws of Life vision, "The Georgia Laws of Life Essay Contest is in every Georgia high school with strong partnerships among Rotary, schools, districts and teachers to provide the opportunity for students to reflect upon their lives, express personal beliefs and affirm strong character values through writing."

Your club can help support the contest throughout the state and in your local community. Members from Sponsoring Rotary Clubs volunteer as Essay Judges to select Grade, School and State Winners in February. Rotary Club Sponsors who choose to also serve as a School Partner with a local school host Student Recognition Events honoring students, parents and teachers from their partner school. On an International Note

Moving Fire and Radio Waves To Celebrate Independence—Rotary is There!



On 15 September 1821, the countries of Costa Rica, El Salvador, Honduras, Guatemala and Nicaragua declared their independence from Spain. Initially, it was riders on horseback carrying the news of independence. More recently—dating back to 1964—these countries annually celebrate this monumental declaration of freedom during the month of September with ceremonies and often runners carrying flaming torches over the region’s primary and secondary roads.

This bicentennial year, the Torch of Independence left Nicaragua to be handed to Costa Rica’s Minister of Education, Guisell Cruz at Peñas Blancas, Costa Rica on 13 September. When the flame arrives in Alajuela the next day, Rotarian and Rotaract members in the Rotary Club of Alajuela continue running the torch forward. From Alajuela the torch travels to the country’s present capital, San José, and on to Costa Rica’s old colonial capital, Cartago, where President Carlos Alvarado Quesada hands the flaming torch to 2020 Olympian biker Kenneth Tenico to light a large cauldron.

Gerardo Lorenzen, Governor of Rotary District 4240, heartily endorses all the bicentennial independence celebrations in Central America this year. The usual crowds of cheering spectators viewing the torch processions in 2021 are smaller because COVID is hitting Costa Rica and Nicaragua hard this month. Realizing the virus can’t phase radio waves, twenty amateur radio operators—all members of the Radio Club of Costa Rica—are broadcasting independence joy on the shortwave bands throughout September using a special event call sign TI200I.

Here in the U.S., Dale Covington, K4GSX, makes two-way radio contact with TI200I on 19 September. Dale is presently an Honorary Member of the Rotary Club of Marietta, GA led by President Will Allen. In an address ca. September 15th, Governor Lorenzen concludes, “. . . felix 200 años de Independencia Centroamérica, Viva Rotary!”
