From Our District Governor

Help Select Our Future District Leader

It is time to begin the process of selecting our District Governor for the Rotary Year 2026-2027. The elected individual will become District Governor on July 1, 2026. We invite you to become more familiar with how the process works and to think about individuals who might be good candidates for this important responsibility.

Rotary International requires that the person nominated follow a two-year process of training and preparation before assuming the role of District Governor. During the 2024-2025 Rotary year, the selected individual will be the District Governor Nominee (DGN). This role includes observation and training, and participation at District events. It also includes participation at the Rotary Zone 33-34 training institute 2024-2025 and Presidents-Elect Training Seminar and participating as a non-voting member of key district committees. During the 2025-2026 Rotary year, the selected individual will be the District Governor-Elect (DGE). Training and observation activities continue, including participation at the Zone training institute and at the Rotary International Assembly (an assembly and training program for District Governors-Elect from over 500 Rotary Districts in the world) in Orlando in January 2026.

Our district utilizes a Nominating Committee process. Your help in identifying qualified applicants would be appreciated. Please look within your club and within your Rotary network to identify those Rotarians who met the qualifications and have the desire to get involved at the district level.

Interested applicants must have the support of their club indicated by resolution and submit it along with their completed application and including a brief resume to District Executive Secretary, Teri White by **November 1, 2023**. Interviews of selected applicants, by the committee, will take place on **Saturday**,

November 18, 2023.

Qualifications, Requirements and Instructions

- Be a current active member in good standing of a functioning Rotary club in District 6900.
- Have full qualifications for membership in the strict application of the club membership provisions, and the integrity of the Rotarian's classification must be without question.
- Have served as President of a Rotary club for a full term before July 1, 2023 or be a charter president of a club having served the term from the date of the charter to 30 June, provide that period is for at least six months. (Note: that club may be one outside of District 6900.)
- Demonstrate willingness, commitment, ability, physically and otherwise, to fulfill the duties and responsibilities of the office of Governor as provided in the RI Bylaws section.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the qualifications, duties, and responsibilities of the Governor as prescribed in the RI Bylaws, and submit a signed statement acknowledging a clear understanding of them. This statement shall also confirm that the Rotarian is qualified for the office of Governor and is willing and able to assume the duties and responsibilities of the office and to perform them faithfully.
- The nomination is made in the name of the sponsoring Rotary Club and must include a resolution adopted at a regular meeting of the club. The resolution shall be signed by the Club Secretary, certifying the resolution. The Nominating Committee Chair shall contact the Club President of the candidate to verify the applicant is a member in good standing and to verify that the application is properly signed and certified.

Each applicant is to complete and submit the following:

- District Governor Application along with a brief resume
- The Club Resolution signed by the club President and Club Secretary
- The Governor-nominee Form from Rotary International signed by the Club Secretary

Membership

Building an Irresistible Club: Simple But Not Easy

Rotary International has emphasized the importance of making a bigger impact by increasing our membership. The **Rotary Club of North Cobb** has enjoyed significant growth. Four short years ago our club had 40 active members. This week we will induct our 100th and 101st active member! We have been asked how we accomplished this remarkable growth. The answer is: It is simple, but not easy! In fact, it is difficult, but well worth it! Creating and nurturing a warm, welcoming, engaging, productive, and dare I say, entertaining club takes creativity, planning, and effort. The North Cobb Rotary has put into action several key practices that attract potential members.

The Meeting Experience

Rotary is a membership club, whose product is service. NCRC creates engaging relationships by treating people as they wish to be treated. We learn names, we ask questions (and remember the answers!) We learn special details about people, like partner's names, children, and business name. We invite New Members to serve at the badge table, so they can meet members, hear names (and then read them on the badge) and learn a few each week. Of course, everyone loves good food, so we have our meetings at a restaurant known for its excellent food.

We build an environment of trust and respect, and people can feel it. This includes starting and finishing every meeting on time, calling upon people by name, moving the focus around the room through "Sunshines" (sometimes called Happy Dollars) and announcements. Every meeting is carefully planned, with a timestamp to be sure we can get through the many special things we do each week, such as Inductions, Paul Harris Awards, special announcements, and a joke (or two!) This planning happens throughout the week, so that nothing is forgotten, and we include it all.

Members never know what will happen next week, so they don't want to miss! Meetings are informative in two important ways. First, a "Service & Social Events Coming Soon" slides are projected in a PowerPoint, so everyone can see and know what is coming up. One member creates QR codes for easy sign up. We show photos from the week before, so we can see pictures of ourselves and our Rotary friends, doing service. We over-communicate, to keep people in "the know." Second, we have a dynamite speaker every week, one who has something important to say and can say it well. Members invite interesting people they know to be our speakers and make the introduction. Members leave the

meeting knowing more than they did when they came in.

But the “secret sauce” of the North Cobb Rotary is: We have fun! Always! We might sing a song; we might hear a poem. We might have someone dressed up as a hotdog (advertising a BBQ) or as a witch (near Halloween.) Recently, Carnac the Magnificent showed up to offer the Club Assembly. You never know! Meetings are fresh, entertaining, and sometimes surprising, which requires creativity and effort.

The Service Experience

Just like our meetings, our service experiences revolve around relationships. We plan and participate in many service events, on any day of the week, at any time of the day. That accommodates the various schedules of our members. Sometimes our service is appropriate for partners, neighbors, children, and even grandchildren to, which gives us an opportunity to learn names and become acquainted. Every service event has a Rotarian “Champion” who has a connection. That member knows what needs to be done, arranges the supplies, the instructions, the details, so fellow members can just show up and be ready to work. We do what our members want to do. Last year we participated in about 100 separate service activities. This year we will likely have more. Our members see a need and we fill it. This may be filling a food pantry, distributing food, gathering crutches and walkers or winter coats, or making summer lunches for hungry kids. We service children, seniors, disabled, veterans, homeless, recovering addicts, and more. We serve whatever cause our members care about.

The Social Experience

Like our meetings and service events, our social events are focused on relationships. We sponsor a social event once each month, always at a new, interesting, or unique location. We include our partners and have great food. Sometimes there is a service component to our social events. This ties us all together.

The Ideal Member

North Cobb Rotary has identified the qualities that make an ideal member. They must: (1) have a servant’s heart, (2) live or work near our meeting location so attending meetings is convenient, and (3) be willing to get out of bed most Thursday mornings to come to a 7am breakfast. This is what it takes. We ask people to “lean in” and attend as many meetings and service events as they comfortably can. This works!

Make a Bigger Impact

To make a bigger impact in our community, we need more members. We attract more members by sincerely loving them, caring for their needs, hearing their interests, and making encounters satisfying and meaningful. This is everyone’s responsibility.

Fortune favors the bold. So be bold, be creative, be thoughtful, be loving... and watch the magic happen!

GRSP Conclave Ushers in Class of 2023-24

diversity among the Georgia Rotary Student Program's Class of 2023-24 in Macon. Directed by Chair Emeritus and GRSP Foundation President Jim and Lynn Drake, the phenomenal program started with the GRSP Peace Song, featuring the lyrics by Administrator Emeritus Janis Comer and composition of 1994-95 Alumnus Bernard Wong. GRSP scholars include 20 males and 22 females from 24 countries. The scholars are sponsored by 93 Rotary Clubs within Georgia and attending 24 public and private colleges/universities throughout the state.

District 6920 Governor Felix Smith jump started the sessions last weekend with Rotary 101 by sharing his passion for service. Chair Emeritus, Parliamentarian and Judge Bert Guy provided preventative reminders of laws in Georgia while Chair Emeritus and Foundation President Drake added highlights in the GRSP student handbook. What a treasure we uncovered when Trustee Dave Razo energized and empowered the group with the keynote reminder: I am STRONG and COURAGEOUS!

Within the class, 22 are from Europe, two from Asia, five from Africa, seven from South America, four from Central America and from North America. GRSP picked up students who represent three new countries (Curacao, Gabon, Rwanda). Those countries will be calculated in next year's alumni statistics alumni our tallied when the program ends in May. To date, our GRSP Alumni stands at 3,775 from 109 countries in 77 years. This is the 76th class as the Class of 2020-21 did not have any students as the result of the COVID-19 Pandemic. We were fortunate to have District leadership from 6900 with DGN Steve Ivory, 6910 with DG Brandy Swanson and PDG Bill St. Clair and 6920 with DG Felix Smith, DGE/Trustee Todd Freesemann and PDG/GRSP Foundation Director Heather Kellen participating in events all weekend.

We are indebted to this year's Conclave Host, District 6920 and under the direction of the **Rotary Club of Macon, the Rotary Club of Macon North and the Rotary Club of Downtown Macon** with Rebecca Grist and GRSP 6920 Director Milton Heard as co-chairs. We appreciate each person who serves as host family, GRSP club coordinator or a weekend host and thank those who provided transportation and/or a meal to our scholars. GRSP is forever grateful for our leadership, staff and trustees, particularly Vice Chair Ian Bond, who invested a substantial amount of effort for his oversight of this Conclave event.

The first GRSP class in 1946 consisted of four students from Norway, France, Czechoslovakia and Greece. As the GRSP logo states, we have literally been "bringing nations together since 1946!" Full and partial scholarship options are available and the application is open now through the end of October. In a recent survey among participants, many students shared heartfelt appreciation for this writing opportunity. More than 200 students from 60 participating high schools completed the survey.

- Over 97% of students responded that writing the essay made them more aware of the

importance of personal values.

- 95% of students felt that writing a Laws of Life essay and reading/hearing other essays gave them a better understanding of other students.
- Of students who attended a meeting at their Rotary Club, 80% said that meeting the members inspired them to broaden their aspirations for college or career.

September 11-17 of this year is Celebrate Community Week. John Hewko, the General Secretary and CEO of Rotary International wrote, *"we're encouraging Rotary and Rotaract clubs to partner with local Kiwanis, Lions, and Optimist clubs on a service project that will have a long-term impact in your community."*

The **Rotary Club of North Atlanta (RCNA)** got a head start this August.

For the past three years, the RCNA has hosted a used medical equipment collection day for FODAC (Friends of Disabled Adults and Children - a local non-profit that gathers, refurbishes and distributes wheelchairs, hospital beds, and other medical gear to those in need), joined by a local Lions club as well as the seven clubs in the **DeKalb County Rotary Council** and **The Atlanta Metro Rotaract club**.

Volunteers at the event team up to drive to various pick-up locations in the greater metro area. A total of ten teams including 54 volunteers from six Rotary clubs, Rotaractors from Atlanta and Sao Paulo, Brazil, and Lions from the North DeKalb Lions Club participated.

Jon Yaeger, past president of the RNCA and former chair of the DeKalb Rotary Council joined the Lions in 2019 to look for opportunities for the two volunteer organizations to collaborate and partner on projects. He is serving as president of the North DeKalb Lions Club this year, to better understand the Lions culture and how they work.

Marietta Team Feeds MUST Ministry Residents



Teamwork is one of the most important tools as it relates to organizational efficiency. Phenomenal miracles were accomplished this past Thursday as a bare bones crew of seven Rotarians prepared and served a hot meal to 100 diners in a three-hour timeframe at the MUST Ministry Fishes and Loaves Kitchen with customers lined up end to end in the dining hall and out into the reception area. This is the largest number of diners present in several years. After MUST residents are provided for, MUST opens their kitchen to the local homeless. No one is turned away. Gratitude, thanks and appreciation to all who turned out, leaned in, and made it happen. The **Rotary Club of Marietta** in partnership with MUST Ministries has been preparing meals and feeding the homeless every 2nd Thursday of each month for approximately 20 years.

This month's faithful crew of Rotarians consisted of Doug Haynie, Adam Hobbs (son of Harold), Chef Harold Hobbs, Dr. John Knox, Holly Walquist, Marlys Williams, and Fred Beloin (a welcome volunteer briefly pirated from Marietta Metro Rotary), creating a smoothly coordinated unit and ensured that no guest left hungry. Every morsel of food was consumed, - no leftovers this week whatsoever. There was enough to feed 100, but seconds were meager and the lines were long.
